#### Fire Agate (chalcedony)

No reports from the club, but last field trip was to Round Mountain, Az. in the search of Fire Agate so in this issue it is only fitting that we explore this beautiful gemstone in depth.

Fire agate, a variety of chalcedony, is a semi-precious natural gemstone found only in certain areas of the world. For us that means northern Mexico and Southwestern U.S. The best coming from Arizona.



Approximately 24-36 million years ago these areas were subjected to massive volcanic activity during the Tertiary Period. The fire agates were formed during this period of volcanic activity when hot water, saturated with silica and iron oxide, repeatedly filled cracks and bubbles in the surrounding rock ,much like a pearl is formed. A multitude of shapes and colors are caused by mineral impurities in the silica created by the Schiller effect like found in mother-of-pearl. It is these impurities which make the fire agate distinctive. Fire agates have beautiful iridescent rainbow colors, similar to opal, with a measurement of hardness on the Mohs scale of between 6.5 and 7 which prevent issues of fading, cracking and scratching.

A little about cutting and finishing. When you look at your collection, we can call the white to clear layer as the top. The dark or embedded with local stone as the bottom. Now if you did not know this, it is the chalcedony or white that you have to remove to

discover the fire "assuming of course" you were not one of the very lucky ones that found a fire agate with all the fire showing! Why? Remember how it was formed? Like a pearl, layer by layer and we have to reverse the process to discover and uncover the fire! Personally, I think some of the most beautiful stones are carved in the Baroque fashion, following the fire along the layers, but it takes extreme patience and skill. In my opinion, don't try to force it into any particular shape - if you are uncomfortable with anything but symmetrical shapes or intend to cut only calibrated sizes for standard mountings, you will find working with and finishing fire agate a very frustrating job. It doesn't adapt easily to this style of cutting unless you don't mind wasting a lot of color and being satisfied with whatever color happens to be left, if any, after you make a predetermined shape out of one. Sometimes this style of cutting is unavoidable, but if you let the area of best bright color define the edges of the finished stone, you will end up with a much more pleasing and a much more valuable stone. Often, stones that showed only minimal color and brightness in the gold layers are capable of being turned into extremely brilliant multicolored gems, by having the patience to stick with the grinding.

There is no feeling more exciting than to start seeing a beautiful new bright color coming out from it's millions of years of hiding, just waiting for you to unveil it for the first but not last time since the day it stopped being formed. ~Scott Ehlers
